RE: Preserving the Integrity of the 1033 Program

Dear Chairmen Inhofe and Smith and Ranking Members Reed and Thornberry:

On behalf of the National Association of Police Organizations (NAPO), representing over 241,000 sworn law enforcement officers across the nation, I am writing to urge you to maintain Section 1054 of S. 4049 in the Fiscal Year 2021 National Defense Authorization Act conference report and refrain from putting further restrictions on the Department of Defense 1033 program.

Programs like the 1033 program have been vital resources in allowing State, local and Tribal law enforcement to acquire items used in search and rescue operations, disaster response, and active shooter situations that they otherwise would not be able to afford. This equipment has not led to the "militarization" of police, but rather has proven to be essential in protecting communities against violent criminals with increasing access to sophisticated weaponry, IEDs, and body armor.

Section 1054 of S.4049 prohibits the transfer of bayonets, grenades, weaponized tracked combat vehicles, and weaponized drones – items that are not used in community policing – to State, local or Tribal law enforcement agencies. It also ensures that any law enforcement agency that receives surplus military equipment from the 1033 program trains its officers on "respect for the rights of citizens under the Constitution of the United States and deescalation of force."

With these provisions, Section 1054 works to restore community trust in law enforcement while recognizing how vital the equipment provided through this program is to protect the safety of our officers and the communities they serve.

Given the unfortunately high number of mass shootings that have occurred in recent years and the fact that state and local law enforcement are the first line of defense during any incident including foreign and domestic terrorism, Congress should be ensuring law enforcement agencies are able to acquire such equipment for the protection of their communities, not limiting it. NAPO would oppose the inclusion of any further restrictions on this program or the equipment it provides in the FY 2021 NDAA conference report.

Therefore, NAPO urges you to maintain Section 1054 of S. 4049 and protect the ability of State, local and Tribal law enforcement to access necessary surplus military equipment. If you would like to discuss this issue further, please feel free to contact me at: (703) 549-0775.
